THAW DETECTOR

WHEN YOU BUY frozen food at the supermarket, how can you tell if the food has been thawed and refrozen, giving bacteria an opportunity to breed? You can't. But that could soon change, with the introduction of a patented detector that makes shoppers see red when food goes bad.

The detector relies on thin wire, made from nickel and titanium, that changes shape when warmed. At temperatures above freezing, the wire contracts with enough force to rip a small sheet of green paper, exposing a red label beneath it. When the wire cools, it returns to its original shape, but the red warning remains visible.

Smaller than a thumbnail, the detector contains only a few cents worth of raw materials and requires no power source. A larger, resettable version can monitor a home refrigerator.

Sandia National Laboratories manager David Martinez and University of New Mexico engineering professor Mo Shahinpoor developed the detector in 1994 but received the patent only this April. They envision the device being used not only to detect defrosted food, but also to warn if sensitive pharmaceuticals, such as insulin, have been exposed to heat. – Edward D. Flinn.

FIGHTING MOSQUITOES WITH POND SCUM

MOSQUITOES ARE MORE than an annoyance. Worldwide, mosquitoes-borne illnesses infect about 700 million people a year and kill 3 million. But a Florida researcher has come up with a novel way to control the little buggers - put them on a diet.

Dov Borovsky, an insect biologist at the University of Florida at Vero Beach, says he has perfected a diet pill that alters mosquito digestion, making it impossible for them to feed and lay eggs. He synthesizes the hormone that switches the mosquito's digestive system on and off. In the lab, the hormone is absorbed by chlorella algae, a green scum found in ponds and swamps. The modified algae is reintroduced where mosquitoes breed, and the bugs larvae feast on the algae and starve to death within 72 hours.

Borovsky says the starvation approach, unlike pesticides, does not alter the environment, and mosquitoes don't become resistant to the hormone because the chlorella stops producing it within three weeks. He expects to have his "diet pill" on the market within a year.

A CHANGING TIDE

The River Ganges has always been regarded as a sacred river. The Hindu belief is that the river's waters will purify your soul and wash away your sins. Unfortunately, however, India's sacred river, like waterways and seas all over the world, has become the victim of pollution. The river flows on a 15,000 – mile course from the Himalayan glaciers. On its way, it passes more than 2,500 industrial plants that, for years, have been discharging their effluent into its waters. By 1985, one man thought it had gone on long enough. M. C. Mehta, a lawyer, filed a petition. It took eight years for this petition to make its way through the Indian legal system, but now, at last, it is beginning to take effect. Already 190 of the worst offenders – mostly tanneries and distilleries – have been forced to close. The same fate awaits many others if they fail to clean up their acts.
